MINUTES, MAY 24, 2010

The TCRS meeting began a little late as many of us were out in the parking lot gathering vases, bowls

and other items for our annual show on June 6. Once underway we admired the beautiful table runner quilt that was made by Nancy Rousseau for a fundraiser (silent auction) at the upcoming show.

Harlow Young gave a talk on preparing our roses for the show. He shared his recent experience of attending and clerking at the American Rose Society show held in Shreveport, LA, where he had a blast. He mentioned the tables were lower than ours, and this made it easier for the judges to see the tops of the rose entries. As Bob Louie learned from his Portland Rose Show experience, Harlow saw many people using pop bottles (tops cut off and glued back on upside down) to carry their rose entries. This protects petals and is lightweight. He saw many ice chests full of roses on ice. Many people used nylon stockings to clean the rose leaves. Saran wrap is allowed as wedging material at our show and many others, but not at all of them. Many of us use return mail labels instead of hand writing our name on entry tags. Styrofoam or paper cups with their bottoms cut out and a slit down the side can be used to protect a bloom on its way from home to the entry table.

Harlow brought several single stem blooms which were divided between the two sides of the audience. After teams of two prepped the blooms, all of us voted for the best bloom in several show categories.

Wearing another hat as Hospitality Chair, Cyndy says “Thanks to those individuals who brought delicious goodies for the hospitality room: Jolene Angelos, Norma Boswell, the Campbells, Linda Mercer, Marlyn Miles, and Cyndy Sharer. I hope I’ve not left anyone out—my apologies, if I did.”

- Add one more rose to the garden, assuming you have some room left.
- Teach someone how to grow roses.
- Call your friends and have a party in your fabulous, heavy blooming rose garden—thereby inspiring friends to grow roses and maybe even join your club.
- Head to Tacoma and visit Pt. Defiance and check out those beautiful gardens.
- Give your excess roses to someone whose spirit needs helping, to hospitals and nursing homes or even that person down the road who is not healthy enough to get out and enjoy growing roses.

What great advice! A big thanks to Greg and Jenifer Mick for these uplifting suggestions.

I also want to highlight all the rose-related activities coming up this year. Foremost are all the rose shows and displays going on from one end of the district to the other. There is nothing our societies do that has as much meaning and impact as hosting a rose show or

display in our local communities. These are the best vehicles we have to showcase what our hobby is all about—and at the same time generate renewed interest among the public in becoming part of us.

Over the course of the summer and fall, District activities are also playing an important role. The year began with a school/audit for Consulting Rosarians hosted by the Tacoma Rose Society on May 15. It was well attended and resulted in five new CRs in the District. On June 26, the Ft. Vancouver Rose Society will host the District's Annual Rose Show and Convention.

Activities will include the rose show as well as a workshop on exhibiting and judging challenge classes, and several garden tours. A month later, on Saturday, July 31, the District is offering a full day's workshop on Miniature and Miniflora roses, also in the Vancouver, WA area. And at the end of October (22-24) we'll hold our annual Fall Conference featuring national speakers, schools, workshops, seminars, a photo contest, prizes and awards, a silent auction, and a great raffle. Come and catch the Pacific Northwest excitement.

'Walking on Sunshine' (at right) has tight clusters of bright yellow petals with anise fragrance. The plant has fantastic bloom production and plant vigor, with attractive rounded habit and medium green super-glossy disease resistant foliage. This is an easy to grow bush—great for beginners. It was bred from ('Sequoia Gold' x 'Baby Love') x (unnamed seedling x 'Amber Queen').

'Dick Clark' is a medium-tall grandiflora introduced by Weeks Roses and hybridized by Tom Carruth/Christian Bedard. No two cinnamon-scented flowers are alike. Black-red buds spiral open to swirls of cream, washed with vibrant cherry pink. Sun- struck petals blush burgundy, finishing a deep, dark red. Foliage is shiny green; cutting stems are long. Vigorous, easy to grow.
